

SUMMERMATTERS The Cost of Summer

While middle and upper-income children are able to keep learning each summer by visiting museums and camps or going on family vacations, children from low-income families are falling behind. High-quality summer learning programs are a cost-effective way to prevent summer learning loss and close both the opportunity and achievement gaps.



\$37 per day

The average cost per day for each child in an 8 hour program

\$186 per week

The average cost per week for each child in an 8 hour program



\$2.23 - \$7.14 per hour

Summer learning programs surveyed cost between \$2.23 and \$7.14 per pupil, per hour.

70% staff wages

The largest portion of the budget (up to 70%) among all summer learning programs surveyed was program staff.

Public and private funding

Most programs surveyed relied on a mix of public funding (such as ASES Supplemental, 21st CCLC, and LCFF) and private funding from foundation grants.



Learning Loss

Children from lowincome families lose more than two months of reading achievement every summer.



Achievement Gap

By fifth grade, lowincome children without summer learning opportunities are already two years behind their peers.



Poor Nutrition

Without high-quality summer learning, children can gain unhealthy weight from too much time indoors and poor nutrition.
